

Rotator cuff surgery

Our shoulder joint is the most flexible joint in our body. We use it every day for the simplest of movements, but don't always appreciate the strain it comes under. Over time, it can become painful as wear and tear or injury causes the group of muscles (the rotator cuff) around the joint to tear.

Usually, pain in the shoulder joint should recover on its own with some rest time. However, if the pain lasts for longer than several days, or you find everyday movements such as combing your hair becomes too painful, it's time to seek medical advice.

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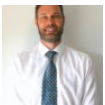
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What to expect from rotator cuff surgery

What does rotator cuff surgery involve?

The aim of the surgery is to repair the tear in the tendon(s). This is almost always performed as a minimally invasive arthroscopic (keyhole) procedure.

Where will my surgery take place?

All surgical procedures take place at KIMS Hospital in Maidstone. Most outpatient appointments, including follow up appointments with your Consultant, can take place at either KIMS Hospital or Sevenoaks Medical Centre.

How long will I stay in hospital?

Most patients are able to go home the same day of surgery, but some patients are occasionally admitted for an overnight stay. This is dependent on the progress you make following your procedure as well as the time of day your procedure takes place.

Your Consultant will be able to discuss this with you prior to your procedure and you will learn about rehabilitation from our Physical Therapy team.

How long will it take to recover?

The pain should ease shortly after the surgery with the help of pain relief given during your stay. You will also be given pain relief to take home.

It is important that you give yourself the time to heal properly and complete your physiotherapy programme following surgery. Recovery time will vary from patient to patient, but you will have to wear a sling for up to four weeks and may find that use of your arm is restricted during this time.

Rehabilitation typically takes two to four months but, in some cases, may take up to a year. Your Consultant will be able to discuss pain control and length of recovery with you during your consultation.

When can I drive and go back to work?

It may be between five to six weeks from your procedure before you can drive again. Your Consultant or Physiotherapist will be able to advise you at your review appointment.

Depending on your job, it is likely you will need to take some time off work to support your recovery. You should discuss your progress during your review appointment for advice on returning to work.
